FOUND! ONE RADAR PICKET SHIP! USS TRACER AGR-15

The Tracer has been located alive, but not well. She is sing in the waters off St Pauls Island which is part of the Pribilof Island chain in the Bering Sea. At the present time, she is owned by a company called UNISEA out of Washington state.

Tracer, now called Unisea, is considered to be a barge by her present owners because her rudder and screw have been removed. She is presently being used as a seafood processing plant.

Locating her came about because of our display on the Battleship Massachusetts. While doing some work on the display signs for the ships, I got thinking about the Tracer. While it has been known that she was sold to be used as a fish processing plant, no one was able to find out where she was. In conversations with other organizations that deal with liberty ships, I was told nothing could be found of the Tracer and, as far as everyone was concerned, she was probably scrapped. So while waiting for hurricane Floyd to hit Rhode Island, I decided to make a few phone calls. On my first call to the harbor master at Unalaska, I Sit pay dirt. He not only knew about the Tracer, he had alped to convert her to a fish processing plant. He gave me a few other phone numbers and I finally got hold of the owners. I was then given the phone number of Al Mendoza, the person who they said knows everything about the Unisea (Tracer). Once we got in touch with one another, after playing phone tag for a few days, I found out he did know quite a bit about the Tracer and her history. He told me that the Tracer arrived at Dutch Harbor in 1975 to begin the conversion to a seafood processing plant. He will be sending me some pictures of the Unisea (Tracer) as she looks now. As I get more information I will pass it along. For Mr. Mendoza's help, YAGR'S will be sending him a Tracer hat.

Battleship Massachusetts

Since the last YAGRGRAM, preparations have been progressing for the YAGR'S display that will be on the Battleship Massachusetts. The ship's curator and I have had a couple of meetings. The purpose of these meetings was for both of us to get a better understanding of what is expected from both parties.

In our last meeting, the general format of how each of the ship's history and ship's emblems will be displayed was approved by him. The plan at this time is to have a display board (sign) showing the ship's emblem and a brief history of the ship. Each ship along with RADRON ONE ar RADRON TWO will have its own display board. The displays will be in color to show the ship's emblems as they were meant to be seen and also to make a good impression on the viewing public.

While I cannot report the exact compartment YAGR'S will have at this time, I hope to in the near future. The Massachusetts is still in the planning stages of rearranging its displays and the ship's curator hopes to be able to assign us a compartment in a few months. As soon as we find out, a layout and cost estimate will be done and work will start soon afterward.

We do have a good start on the funding to do this work thanks to Bill Simcox and everyone who has made a donation. Bill donated the model of the USS Guardian AGR-1 to YAGR'S. The donations to date total \$2,893.20. Anyone wishing to make a donation can send it to me. Please make your checks out to YAGR'S.

To keep our cost down, I would like to hear from anyone who might be able to help with this project. First—everything will have to be of museum quality work. If a one has a printing or graphics business, wood working business or any other type of business that might be able to accomplish building our display and would like to help, please get in touch with me.

Also we are considering having some of our members do some of the work aboard the ship to help keep the cost down. I have started a list of people that have already said that they will be willing to do some ship board work. This work can be anything from cleaning the compartment to building display cases. Something to keep in mind is that I can make arrangements for those of us who will be doing the work to stay on board the ship and be bunked in staterooms. Again, if you think you might be able to help, get in touch with me.

At this time I want to ask everyone to see what they might have that can be donated for this display. Do not send anything yet. Just let me know what you have. I am especially looking for pictures of the ships in rough seas and/or covered with ice. After I have had the pho copied, I will return the originals to you. I have not had much feed back on this, so see what you can do.

Display Signs

To help in the general layout of the display boards for a ships, Al Nanninni (AGR-15, 1960-62), John Hemminger (AGR-2, 1960-61) and I got together on the Battleship Massachusetts. We worked out a format that we feel will be very appealing. Once all the typesetting and graphics are done on the computer and placed on disk, we can get it to the graphics company to get started.

It's Up To You

Hat Pin Or Patch

It is hoped to have all ship's emblems reproduced, either as a hat pin or a patch. The problem with this is the cost involved, as there are 27 different emblems, and for each one a minimum will have to be ordered. It is just not practical to order all 27 emblems at one time due to the cost of doing so. For example, if all 27 were ordered and we had to order a minimum of 50 of each emblem, 1,350 pieces would be needed. If the cost for each piece is \$3.00 that equals \$4,050.00 to pay up front. It would be more logical to have a few emblems made up at any one time and use the money received from the sale of those sold to order a few other ones. This way the sale of these items can pay for itself. Some people have told me that they would like to collect all 27 emblems. If there are enough people who would like to do this, I will get information on the cost for either pins or patches. Also let me know whether you prefer pins or patches. If there isn't enough interest, we will just drop the whole thing.

Sea Service Award

Joe Biron (AGR-9, 1958-60, CO AGR-14, 1964-65) and Al Nannini(AGR-15, 1960-62) have been busy on this project. Joe has been in touch with the head of the Awards and Special Projects Branch. A letter has been submitted to the Secretary of the Navy via the Chief of Naval Operations. There are three offices at CNO that have to sign off and one at the SECNAV. Joe has been told this can take a few months to process. We will keep you updated as we get new information to pass along.

Sea Stories

Joe Biron (XO AGR-9, 1958-59,CO AGR-14,1964-65) and Ralph Edwards (CO AGR-9, 1958-59)

Shortly after arriving on station one weekend in the spring of 1959 the Investigator was on holiday routine when a skunk was reported at 15 miles closing on a collision course. The skipper was notified and he changed course. Within minutes the skunk altered its heading to remain on a collision course. Needless to say the entire watch kept a close eye on this approaching contact after such an unusual maneuver. In less than a hour it was close enough to identify as a soviet ELINT trawler that was fishing for electronic intelligence. It was the first time a soviet ELINT vessel had approached this close (about 300 miles) to CONUS. The skipper had just finished reading the monthly intelligence magazine which featured an article on the ELINT trawlers. He decided to try a little ploy to lure them in a little closer. He figured they were taking careful measurements of our electronic emissions. Our AN/SPS 12 air search radar was taken out of radiation. After putting out the word on the 1MC, every still and movie camera on the ship was topside and ready to shoot. When the contact closed to 1,000 yards, we were able to identify it as the soviet trawler "Vega" and reported this by FLASH message, as Captain Edwards put it "To God and everybody else". When the trawler closed to about 300 yards on our port quarter on a parallel course, the Captain ordered the air search antenna trained on it with full power, figuring to disable its monitoring instruments. We never did find out the effects of this gambit, but we probably cooked all the eggs in their galley. We then veered away to starboard and we both went our ways.

NORAD notified us that search aircraft were being sent out to view and presumably to photograph the "Vega". As dusk was falling Captain Edwards offered to illuminate the target with stars shells from our trusty 3"50s. This request drew a rapid response from all levels of the chain of command. "DO NOT OPEN FIRE"! It seems they had some aversion to starting World War III.

Bob Marshall (AGR-8, 1961-65) sent in that the Interceptors Captain at the time had his picture published in All Hands magazine as one of the few Captains who had a monogram command. This Captain was **G. R.** West., the ship hull number being **GR-8**.

We are still trying to locate the ships emblem for, YAGR-1, YAGR-4, YAGR-11, YAGR-12, YAGR-13, YAGR-14, YAGR-15 (both Tracer and Interrupter). We have almost reached the point of no return in regards to locating these emblems, if they ever existed. I myself have formed new friendships and have met some very interesting people that I would never have met except for the reunions. This along with renewing friendships from over 35 to 40 years ago has been a great reward for me. As YAGR'S has grown quite rapidly in the years since it was established, my hope is that we will continue to grow and hold many more successful reunions.


