


If you have paid your dues and there is not a date on the label or you have not received your membership card and your updated list of former crewmen from your ship/ships, please get in touch with me.

50 Years

2005 marks fifty years since the first radar picket ship, the USS Guardian YAGR-1, was commissioned. Also in 1955 the USS Lookout YAGR-2, USS Skywatcher YAGR-3 and USS Searcher YAGR-4 were placed in commission. (You all know the YAGR was changed to AGR in 1958).

To mark the occasion, we are planning to make our tenth reunion in San Francisco something special. As mentioned earlier we are hoping to set up a post-reunion tour on the SS Jeremiah O'Brien when she gets underway on Sunday the 22nd of May. In preliminary talks with the O'Brien, we are hoping to set up some type of memorial service for our departed crewmen and I am sure we will have something special for those attending the reunion. The O'Brien ties up in San Francisco at Fisherman's wharf, pier 45.

We will be in close contact with the O'Brien in setting up what we hope will be an unforgettable reunion experience. A note in regards to the O'Brien: Tom Patterson, a former Commanding Officer of the Guardian (1954-56), is the Chairman and CEO of the National Liberty Ship Memorial which owns the O'Brien.

New display installed

A new display was recently installed in our exhibit. This display gives information about the WW II Liberty ships, both the standard design and the Boxed Aircraft Liberty which was derived from the standard design of liberty ship.

The top portion of the display covers the informational part along with WWII pictures taken from war posters. The bottom portion has two models of Liberty ships, one being the standard design and the other a Boxed Aircraft Liberty ship. A note in regard to the Boxed Aircraft model: it is most likely the

only model of a Liberty Ship in this configuration on display. As we all know there were only 38 built so there is not much interest on anyone's part to have built a model of one.

The models are mounted on copper sheeting and the back of the display area has a mirror so that the back side of the models may be seen.

One item that still has to be done for the display is to install another light to brighten the right side of the display. This will be done in the very near future.

Work to complete the radar room will be ongoing in the next few months. This work will include finishing the wood deck in front on the radar room. This will finish the outside of the display. The interior work that has to be done includes lighting and installing the radar plotting board, painting a section of bulkhead black, installing the radar scope along with a console next to it, detailing the interior of the space to mimi working radar room and adding lighting.

What Did They See?

"They joined the Navy to see the world;" but other than the Boston Shipyard, the men of the Guardian saw only one "foreign" port in 1958. Guardian and a Coast Guard Cutter were asked to visit Portland, Maine, to conduct an Open House of the ships and to each provide a group to march in the Memorial Day parade. The officers and men in their dress uniforms manned the Guardian's rail as she moved into her designated spot on the pier behind the cutter. It was an impressive sight. Guardian almost resembled a manowar except that she didn't render a gun salute. She couldn't because she didn't have a saluting battery. To prepare for the parade, Guardian's deck crew had made several "U.S.S. Guardian" banners and pennants. It was reported that the Guardian contingent performed admirably in the parade.

Mistaken Identity

Before leaving Davisville, RI. for Portland, a new reuit, Seaman Holmes, had reported for duty. He seemed to oe shorter than what the Navy would have allowed and he had a babyface to go along with his short stature. During Guardian's stay in Portland a couple of events involving Seaman Holmes occurred.

On one of the days a group of about 30 or 40 Sea Scouts, dressed in uniforms almost identical to what the crew was wearing, was touring the ship. Ens. Max Privette, the OOD, spotted a small figure climbing high up on Guardian's mast. Thinking that it was one of the sea scouts and fearing an

injury, Ens. Privette shouted "You up there, come down at once." The figure slowly descended and he was quickly identified as Seaman Holmes.

LTJG Wrafter was OOD when a call was received that one bag of mail was received for Guardian and it was available at the end of the dock. The petty officer passed the word for the Deck Dept. to have one of its men report to the quarterdeck. Within a minute or two, Seaman Holmes dutifully reported. In a twisted version of the old "Hang this pail on the skyhook" gambit, Mr. Wrafter ordered Holmes "Go to the end of the dock, and pick up the two bags of mail for Guardian." About five minutes later, Holmes returned bearing, as was to be expected, the one bag of mail. Mr. Wrafter asked "Where is the other bag of mail?" Holmes replied, "There was only one bag of mail, sir." Mr. Wrafter replied, rather sternly "I said there were two bags. Now, go back down there and get the other bag." Holmes protested "But sir" as he began his walk back down to the end of the dock.

About 15 minutes later, a lone slight figure could be seen trudging up the dock toward Guardian with what appeared to be a mailbag. Upon delivering the bag to the quarterdeck, Holmes reported "Here's the other bag, sir." It turned out the bag was addressed to the Coast Guard Cutter.

One day while the Interpreter was in port, the steam line from the pier to the ship broke. A BM1, rather than going down the brow to the pier, jumped from the ship to the pier. The tide was low. In doing so, he missed his intended landing spot, thereby hitting the bollard on the pier with both legs. He was taken from the pier to the base hospital where it was determined that nothing was broken, but at he should stay off his feet for a few days. The XO etermined that he should do this at home and detailed a

driver and an Ensign that had the duty to take the BM1 home.

Upon arriving at his house, the Ensign knocked on the door and when the BM1's wife opened the door he told her that her husband was in the car.
